A Little About the Blues

R.L. Burnside is the best-known proponent of what is known as the "Mississippi Hill Country blues." A raucous, rhythmic, foot-stomping brand of blues made to be performed in the region's numerous juke joints, Burnside was one of the style's most popular practitioners. Backed by a red-hot band that included two of his sons and a son-inlaw, Burnside's influences were modern performers like Muddy Waters and John Lee Hooker, but his mentor was Mississippi Fred McDowell, so his electric blues sound is firmly footed in the country rather than the city.

Although Burnside worked with folklorist and producer George Mitchell on a series of field recordings during the 1960s, and recorded sides for a handful of small blues labels during the decade, he primarily worked as a farmer until late in his life. Burnside would play on weekends in North Mississippi's numerous juke joints.

In 1992, Burnside appeared with his friend, fellow bluesman Junior Kimbrough, in the documentary film Deep Blues. He had signed with independent Mississippi blues label Fat Possum, which released his debut album, Bad Luck City, the same year.

Recorded live with his family band, Sound Machine, Bad Luck City featured sons Dwayne on guitar and Joseph on bass and son-in-law Calvin Johnson on drums. Kenny Brown would later join Burnside's band on quitar. Burnside followed his debut with the 1994 studio album Too Bad Jim.

Burnside recorded A Ass Pocket O' Whiskey with rocker Jon Spencer in 1996 for the Matador label. It is his Fat Possum label recordings on which his reputation is based, however. Burnside toured several times during the 1990s, including European blues festivals. A live album, Burnside On Burnside, was released in 2001.

The 71-year-old bluesman worked with producer Tom Rothrock on 1998's Come On In. Rothrock added samples, loops and beats to Burnside's organic country blues, creating an entirely new and exciting sound that attracted young fans. During the late-1990s, many of Burnside's early-60s recordings were also released on CD. An obscure artist, by most accounts, during most of his life David "Junior" Kimbrough was one of the last true Mississippi Hill Country bluesmen. Although he recorded sporadically through the years, and performed mostly in North Mississippi juke joints, Kimbrough's early-to-mid-1990s recordings for the Fat Possum label brought his raw, hypnotic country blues sound to a young audience looking for sincerity and authenticity in their blues.

The son of a sharecropper, Kimbrough was raised on a farm, but picked up the guitar at an early age. A naturally aiffed player, Kimbrough learned from local leaend "Mississippi" Fred McDowell, Through the years, Kimbrough held many jobs, including farmer, mechanic and moonshiner, but music was always on his mind.

During the 1950s, Kimbrough ventured to Chicago to pursue his career, but moved to Memphis a few years later. He recorded sides for Sam Phillips' Sun Records, but met with little success. (continued on back)



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Sparky & the Wipers hasn't played much in the past several years. Getting the entire band together with everyone's busy schedules just doesn't seem to work. However, from time to time, the stars align and we get to enjoy that rare combination of Paul Sparky Hinz, Mike Schlenker, Tom Ouimette and Terry DeMars.

Don't expect the Eau Claire band to pull all-night cram sessions to prepare though. "We'll get together a little bit," lead guitarist Mike Schlenker said. "We don't want to rehearse enough to hurt ourselves."

"This is going to be just as much fun to see the people as it is playing," he said. Sparky and the Wipers formed in the late 1990s. The band is named after quitarist and lead singer Paul Hinz, who owns Sparkle Wash of Eau Claire. "He has a unique way of how he hears and plays things," Schlenker said. "His guitar playing is very cool."

In 2001, Sparky and the Wipers released a self-titled CD of blues covers. The group gained a following through energetic live shows. "It's very guitardriven."

Schlenker said of the Wipers' sound. "It's pretty much wide open. We play a slow song or two, but the whole set is very up-tempo and in your face."

The last time the band act together was a Sunday show for our 'Lust for Blues' event this past spring at The Metropolis resort, Action City, As usual, rehearsal time was minimal and the music was rockin'!

At one point it was decided that Sparky & the Wipers wouldn't "officially" perform unless all four members were present. Not the types to sit idly by, Paul, Mike & Terry recruited Tony Basley on drums, giving birth to the lineup known as Sparky & Friends that you'll see today at Tuesday Night Blues.

As far as upcoming shows, there's one. October 1st, they'll be at the Snout in Chippewa Falls.

Kimbrough also recorded for several regional labels during the late-1960s, including a pair of duets with his childhood friend, rockabilly star Charlie Feathers.

Returning to North Mississippi, Kimbrough began throwing house parties, eventually turning his home into a juke joint. Kimbrough would later purchase a larger building, opening Junior's Place juke joint. Through the vears, the club would draw famous customers like members of U2 and the Rolling Stones, who came to watch Kimbrough and his close friend, R.L. Burnside, perform onstage.

Kimbrough appeared in the 1992 documentary film Deep Blues alongside Burnside and Jessie Mae Hemphill. He signed with independent blues label Fat Possum, which released his debut album, All Night Long, the same year. Recorded live, Kimbrough's band for the album included his son Kenny Malone on drums and Burnside's son Gary on bass.

Kimbrough performed a few shows outside of Mississippi, including a trip to England, but mostly stayed around North Mississippi. Kimbrough recorded two additional studio albums for Fat Possum before his death in 1998. Sadly, Junior's Place burned down in 2000, the fire judged an arson.
