Aug 30 Mojo Lemon MoioLemon.com songs, including "Mother Earth," "Gotta Find My Baby," "Rockin' the Blues," 'Steppin' Out," and "Slim's Blues," Slim first appeared outside the United States in 1960, touring with Willie Dixon, with whom he returned to Europe in 1962 in the first of the series of American Folk Festival that brought many notable blues artists to Europe in the 1960s and 1970s. The duo released several albums together on Folkways Records, including, Memphis Slim and Willie Dixon at the Village Gate with Pete Seeger, in 1962. That same vear, he moved permanently to Paris and his engaging personality and well-honed presentation of playing, singing, and storytelling about the blues secured his position as the most prominent blues artist for nearly three decades. He performed regularly in Paris, throughout Europe, and on return visits to the United States. In the last years of his life, he teamed up with respected jazz drummer George Collier. The U.S. Senate honored Slim with the title of Ambassador-at-

Memphis Slim died on February 24, 1988, of renal failure in Paris, France, at the age of 72. He is buried at Galilee Memorial Gardens in Memphis, Tennessee. In 1989, he was posthumously inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame.

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A Little About the Blues

Memphis Slim (September 3, 1915 – February 24, 1988) was an American blues pianist, singer, and composer. A song he first cut in 1947, "Every Day I Have the Blues", has become a blues standard, recorded by many other artists. He made over 500 recordings. He spent most of the 1930s performing in honky-tonks, dance halls, and gambling joints in, Arkansas, and southeast Missouri, He settled in Chicago in 1939, and began teaming with Big Bill Broonzy in, In 1940 and 1941 he recorded two songs for Bluebird Records that became part of his repertoire for decades, "Beer Drinking Woman," and "Grinder Man Blues," These were released under the name "Memphis Slim". Slim became a regular session musician for Bluebird, and his piano talents supported established stars such as John Lee "Sonny Boy" Williamson, Washboard Sam, and Jazz Gillum. Many of Slim's recordings and performances until the mid-1940s were with Broonzy, who had recruited Slim to be his piano player. After World War II, Slim began leading bands that, generally included saxophones, bass, drums, and piano. Slim worked with the emerging independent labels. Starting in late 1945, he recorded with trios for the small Chicago-based label Hy-Tone.

He signed with the Miracle label in the fall of 1946. Recorded at the first session was the boogie "Rockin' the House," from which his band would take its name, Slim and the House Rockers recorded mainly for Miracle through 1949. In 1947, the day after producing a concert by Slim, Broonzy, and Williamson at New York City's Town Hall, folklorist Alan Lomax brought the three musicians to the Decca studios and recorded with Slim on vocal and piano. Lomax presented sections of this recording on BBC radio in the early 1950s as a documentary titled The Art of the Negro, and later released an expanded version as the LP Blues in the Mississippi Night. In 1949, Slim's group, a quintet, was now spending most of its time on tour, leading to offcontract recording sessions for King in Cincinnati and Peacock in Houston.

One of Slim's 1947 recordings for Miracle, released in 1949, was originally titled "Nobody Loves Me", It has become famous as "Every Day I Have the Blues," The tune was recorded in 1950 by Lowell Fulson, and subsequently by a raft of artists including B. B. King, Elmore James, Ray Charles, Eric Clapton, Natalie Cole, Ella Fitzgerald, Jimi Hendrix, Mahalia Jackson, Sarah Vaughan, Carlos Santana, and Lou Rawls. Early in 1950, Miracle regrouped to form the Premium label, and Slim remained on board until in the summer of 1951. During his time with Premium, Slim first recorded his song "Mother Earth."

Slim made just one session for King, but the company bought his Hy-Tone sides in 1948 and acquired his Miracle masters after it failed in 1950. He was never a Chess artist, but Leonard Chess bought most of the Premium masters after the failure. After a year with Mercury Records, Slim signed with United Records in Chicago. The timing was propitious, because he had just added Matt "Guitar" Murphy to his group. He remained with United through the end of 1954. Slim's next steady relationship with a record company had to wait until 1958, when he was picked up by Vee-Jay. In 1959 his band, still featuring Matt "Guitar" Murphy, cut LP Memphis Slim at the Gate of the Horn, which featured a lineup of his best known (continued on back)

David started his career at the age of 5 singing with his Uncles, who were members of the Dorsey Brothers Orchestra. David spent many years developing his talent. His vocals are delivered from his soul, and his performance from his heart. A true bluesman, entertainer and musician. David entertains the fans with his "signature" of handing out Deep Water Reunion monogrammed sunglasses, which combined with his vocal talent, brought the house down this past August at the Fargo Blues Festival. He is a real showman and crowd pleaser, and has earned the respect of the many Mid-West blues musicians, and is known by his peers as a true Mid-West blues legend.

Tommy "SkinTite" Swearingen, A ten year veteran of the Grammy Award winning, WC Handy nominated James Solberg Band, and WC Handy and Grammy Award winning Luther Allison Band. Spent several summers playing with multi Grammy Award winning song writer Will Jennings. Will penned such hits as Joe Cocker's, "Up Where We belong," Barry Mantilow's, "Looks Like We Made It," Doby Gray's, "Slip Sliding Away," Celine Dion's theme from the block buster movie, The Titanic. Several years with Howard "Guitar" Lueatke. Recorded with Jay Stulo and the Mighty Aces. Founding member of the Mickey Larson Band and Big Time David's Blues Show and Revue. Founding member of Robert "One Man" Johnson and the Last Fair Deal Blues Band, featuring Kenny O on the clarinet.

Jerry "Fever" Henry, and his mighty guitar. Rick received some musical influence sharing a recording studio with Warren Zevon, while playing with Mid-West rock favorite Tonque Band.

Larry "Third Degree" Byrne and his amazing keyboard. Larry "Third Degree" is currently playing with the James Solberg Band. He has been with Jim in several bands prior to this band. They played together with Luther Allison in the 70's and 80's. Played some years with Big City Bob and His Ballroom Gliders, Little Ziggy and the Zoo Revue, and the list goes on. Ol' Lar is the heart and soul of any band. His constant feel for the flow of each tune, makes this reunion so exciting. A great asset to any band. Deep Water Reunion is excited to have this auv's craft in the mix.

Bob Corbit, and the Joy of Sax. A road hardened pro who after surviving a 6 month tour with Ike and Tina Turner, focused his talent working several years with Frank Zappa's drummer Jimmie Carl Black. Bob's ability to play two saxophones at the same time has earned him recognition as being one of the most entertaining and combined with his high energy will keep your toe tapping for days. Sue Orfield has been playing the tenor saxophone for close to 30 years. She currently lives in Eau Claire, Wisconsin. She moved to Eau Claire in 2004 from Seattle, Washington, where she was voted "best horn" by the Washington Blues Society in 1999, 2001, 2002, 2003, and 2004. Sue has shared the stage with some musical greats over the years, a few of them being Jo Dee Messina, the Indigo Girls, Bo Diddley, Ann Wilson of Heart, Dizzy Gillespie, Clark Terry, and Bobby McFerrin. Sue's artistry, individuality, and powerful presence on stage make her one of the Midwest's favorite saxophone players. Sue is a welcome addition to the Deep Water Reunion musician quest list.



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
