string bands of the late '20s and early '30s, Formed in Jackson around 1926, the band blended country and blues fiddle music -- both old-fashioned and risqué -- and included auitarist Walter Vinson and fiddler Lonnie Chatmon, with frequent appearances by guitarists Bo Carter and Sam Chatmon, who were also busy with their own solo careers. The musicians were the sons of Ezell Chatmon, uncle of Charlie Patton and leader of an area string band that was popular around the turn of the century. The Mississippi Sheiks (who took their name from the Rudolph Valentino movie The Sheik) began recording for Okeh in 1930 and had their first and biggest success with "Sitting on Top of the World," which was a crossover hit and multi-million seller. In fact, the song became a national standard and has been recorded by Howlin' Wolf, Ray Charles and many more. The Mississippi Sheiks' popularity peaked in the early '30s, and their final recording session happened in 1935 for the Bluebird label. By the end of their career, the prolific and influential string band had

recorded well over 60 songs, including the successful "Stop and Listen."



A Little About the Blues

Although he was certainly inexorably influenced by the pioneering electric guitar conception of T-Bone Walker (what axe-handler wasn't during the immediate postwar era?), Pee Wee Crayton brought enough daring innovation to his plaving to avoid being labeled as a mere T-Bone imitator. Crayton's recorded output for Modern, Imperial, and Vee-Jay contains plenty of dazzlina, marvelously imaginative guitar work, especially on stunning instrumentals such as "Texas Hop," "Pee Wee's Boogie," and "Poppa Stoppa," all far more aggressive performances than Walker usually indulged in.

Like Walker, Connie Crayton was a transplanted Texan, He relocated to Los Anaeles in 1935, later movina north to the Bay Area. He signed with the Bihari brothers' L.A.-based Modern logo in 1948, quickly hitting pay

> dirt with the lowdown instrumental "Blues After Hours" (a kissin' cousin to Erskine Hawkins' "After Hours"), which topped the R&B charts in late 1948. The steaming "Texas Hop" trailed it up the lists shortly thereafter. followed the next year by "I Love You So." But Crayton's brief hitmaking reign was over, through no fault of his own.

After recording prolifically at Modern to no further commercial avail, Crayton moved on to Aladdin and, in 1954, Imperial, Under Dave Bartholomew's savvy production, Crayton made some of his

best waxings in New Orleans: "Every

Dog Has His Day," "You Know Yeah," and "Runnin' Wild" found

Crayton's guitar turned up to the boiling point over the fat cushion of saxes characterizing the Crescent City sound.

From there, Crayton tried to regain his momentum at Vee-Jay in Chicago; 1957's "I Found My Peace of Mind," a Ray Charles-tinged gem, should have done the trick, but no dice. After one-off 45s for Jamie, Guyden, and Smash during the early '60s,

Crayton largely faded from view until Vanguard unleashed his LP, Things I Used to Do, in 1971. After that, Pee Wee Crayton's profile was raised somewhat; he toured and made a few more albums From All Music.com by Bill Dahl

prior to his passing in 1985.

The Nick Fovtik Band is a progressive blues band with strong traditional roots, The band's style coincides with Nick's original solo performances, and expands with a vibrant rhythm section, taking it to a new electrified level. You can hear influences from the old Delta masters, early electric blues musicians, a bit of rock n' roll,

jazz, funk, and sacred steel. A number of the band's original songs can be heard on Nick's debut solo album, 'Up & Downstream', which was released in August of 2014.



The Nick Fovtik Band was founded in the Fall of 2013. They have been playing locally throughout the Chippewa Valley, and have begun to travel throughout the Midwest. The members always know how to put on an entertaining performance to express their passion for the music. The song selection and writing is designed to create a truly unique experience for every audience.




